Description

International relations in premodern East Asia were multidimensional, intersecting, and multilayered. This course seeks to understand diplomacy, trade, war, flows of people and ideas and beliefs, transnational institutions, and ethnic perceptions that constituted the fabric of border-crossing interactions between China, Korea, Japan, Vietnam and other ethnic/political entities in the region with a focus on the fourteenth to mid-nineteenth centuries. This course is designed to the trajectory of "One Asia Community" by looking at the flows of people and materials. In particular, in dealing with aspects of the idea of "One Asia Community" in premodern times, students will be encouraged to challenge the conventional framework of understanding which has been represented, for example, by the paradigm of the investiture-tributary system rooted in the Western theory of political realism and to come up with a global perspective of one's own. With an aim to provide students with diverse views and perspectives, this course will feature guest lectures, class discussion, and learner-centred research.
